Module 1-2 Voiced, Voiceless, and Semi-Voiced ([p]) Sounds

In this module:

• You will learn and practice pronouncing voiced, voiceless, and semi-voiced ([p]) sounds in Japanese.

• You will listen to and practice pronouncing words with those sounds.

The consonants [k], [s], [t], and [h] sounds have their voiced versions, [g], [z], [d], and [b] respectively.

It is difficult to pronounce voiced and voiceless sounds correctly, especially if your first language does not distinguish the two sounds as being different (ex. Chinese).

Also, [h] sounds change to their semi-voiced sounds [p].


